On Second Thought...

Let's play a game of word association. I'll say a word and you say the first word that comes into your mind. Ready? Holiday: ______. Family: ______. I don't know what word (or words) you chose, but there's one word that fits well into all those blanks. Tradition.

This time of year brings with it lots of traditions; traditions that make the holidays feel like the holidays and traditions that, if not observed in some way, can be keenly missed. Growing up there was the smell of the cookies mom made, dad starting his shopping on Christmas Eve, always opening one present on Christmas Eve (a pair of pajamas from Uncle Frank and Aunt Rip), getting to drink Coca-Cola with breakfast on Christmas Day, going to the Christmas Day family worship service at church, then spending the afternoon at my grandmother's house with all of my cousins, aunts, and uncles.

For 20 years the family that lived next door to us growing up invited our family to their home on Christmas Eve. Not just our immediate family, but they opened their home to our extended family, as well. Through the years that became Christmas for us. Then in 2007 the mother of that family passed away. That year our family celebrated Christmas Eve in our own home, with no extended family. My father, in a unilateral and earth-shaking decision, announced that we needed to shake things up and that he was going to grill steaks, instead of the traditional Turkey dinner. And you know what? It was delightful! Thus, a new tradition was born. Sometimes traditions change.

I once heard Lou Holtz say, "Tradition is always under construction." What an interesting statement. I think what he is getting at is that part of what makes our traditions so special is the history behind them, but we must always be aware of the need to adapt our traditions to current circumstances for them to remain relevant. We must never forget the reason behind the tradition; what causes us to establish the tradition in the first place. If external circumstances change, we must look at the underlying reason and ask ourselves, "What is really important here? And how do we go about emphasizing that?" If a few changes need to be made to do that, then it just

gives more people an opportunity to be involved in the construction of the tradition.

One of our most beloved traditions here at Second Presbyterian Church is our Christmas Eve worship. Many people come to the service, many that are not even part of our church family, and that is a wonderful thing. In the past there have often been two services; this year there will be only one at 7:00 p.m. As December 25th falls on a Sunday morning, we also have a unique opportunity this year to celebrate not only Christmas Eve with our church family, but Christmas morning as well. Can you think of a better way to celebrate the birth of Jesus than by coming to church on Christmas morning?

I know that many of you have your own Christmas morning traditions – presents and breakfast, toys and games, reading the paper or going to grandma's. But I ask you, what is behind all the traditions? What is it that is really important here and how do we go about emphasizing that? "Jesus is the reason for the season," the saying goes and we need that saying to remind us that Christmas is not about presents and parties and cooking and reunions and decorations, as important and lovely as those things are.

We will gather in the sanctuary on Christmas morning for one worship service at 10:00 to sing our favorite Christmas carols, hear the joyful news of our Savior's birth, and to hear about how some of our most beloved Christmas traditions came to be. We will come together as a church family to celebrate Emmanuel – God with Us! What a wonderful way to spend the morning. I look forward to being with you on Christmas Day, on Christmas Eve, and throughout the entire Advent season.








Young Adult Meals Volunteers Needed!

In September and November 2016, we printed Part One and Part Two of Second Presbyterian Church's "prehistory" entitled, "Before There Was a Second Presbyterian Church." In the January 2017 issue of the Second Edition we will conclude the "prehistory" with Part Three which summarizes the movements of the Scot-Irish immigrants in America who became the founders of Knoxville/Knox County and established its first Presbyterian Churches in the late 1700s. (That window/partition was lowered on occasion for an overflow crowd in the sanctuary; it was raised to accommodate meetings and classroom use—it did make a grinding noise when lowered!)

While we sat as still as possible, scripture was read, and everyone sang "Silent Night". It was a very special, meaningful occasion for us. There was even a photo in the newspaper.

A few days later, John Jr. broke out with Chicken Pox. It was a light case.
