On Second Thought...

When my son was born I was a senior in seminary, interviewing with different congregations, and thinking a great deal about the mission and calling of the Church, not to mention the mission and calling of disciples of Jesus. I had studied various parts of the book of Acts, both before and during seminary, particularly the travels of Paul. However, I had never just read the book of Acts all the way through as a story.

Since I had already determined that I wanted "storytime with Dad" to be a part of my relationship with my son, I thought it would be great to start off with *The Acts* of the Apostles. First, he would be too young to be bored by it! Second, the first story he would hear, even though he wouldn't remember it, would be the words of Scripture describing the adventures of the followers of Jesus. Third, I thought it would help me to understand the Church better as I read these stories of how things were at the very beginning. My hope was that these stories would give me greater insight into the mission and calling of the Church, so that I would have a better understanding of how to serve the Church in my calling as a pastor and Teaching Elder. After all, God put this story in the bible for a good reason!

You'll have to ask my son if he thinks hearing the entire book of The Acts of the Apostles during the first few weeks of his life made a difference in his life. I know it did in mine. Just reading it as a story, not to study it, dissect it, or preach on it, really gave me a sense of how the Holy Spirit worked in and through individuals to bring God's dream to fruition. The early disciples truly acted as midwives in the birth process of the early Church. It also gave me great insight into the impact the early Church made in the world. And it really helped me to understand the counter-cultural nature of the Church, as story after story is told of the culture pushing back against the Gospel message Peter, Paul, and the others were proclaiming. One message consistently came through loud and clear as I read the story to my son - embracing the Gospel of Jesus Christ is going to put us at odds with the world around us.




However, a second message was also present. The Good News of Jesus Christ is a universal message, calling all kinds of people from all over the world into the family of God. We are called to live out the Gospel in community with one another, and this community is one where people with very different backgrounds and worldviews are held together by their belief in Jesus Christ, through the power of the Holy Spirit.

I think that the Church has sometimes forgotten this. First, we forget that what we have to share with the world is good news. Second, we forget that the world is longing for that good news, the Gospel of Jesus Christ. Third, we forget that we can't live the Christian life alone; Christianity was never meant to be a thing just "between me and God." Fourth, we forget that our identity isn't found in our differences, but in Jesus Christ. It's okay for us to see the world differently, to have different views and ideas and opinions on things, as long as we remember that we are one in Christ, through the Holy Spirit. In fact, regularly talking, praying, studying, and serving with people who are different from us is how God best reveals himself and his will to us. It's almost as if he designed the Church to be that way...

We are going to spend this year studying *The Acts of the Apostles* together on Sunday mornings. Yes – that's a long time to spend on one book of the bible. But our hope is that, as a community of faith, we will all gain greater insight into the mission, the calling, the purpose, and the nature of the Church that God calls into being, so that we can truly live out the Good News of Jesus Christ as a welcoming, faithful and hopeful community of disciples, following Jesus and serving him in the world.



SPIRITUAL FORMATION IN THE NEW YEAR

As the new year begins and we must continue to refrain from meeting together in person, the Discipleship Ministry Unit would like to take a new approach to weekly Bible study and spiritual formation. Beginning in mid–January, Pastor Tim will post a lesson on the website and YouTube channel each week. We will notify you via the email distribution list that the lesson is ready and you will have the chance to review the lesson at your leisure. Then on the 2nd Wednesday of each month (Feb 10, March 10, Apr 14, May 12) at 7:00 p.m., we will meet on Zoom to discuss the lessons from the previous month. This will be a time to bring your questions, comments, and insights and share them with the group. We think this will allow you to complete the studies according to your own schedule and will only require you to set one time aside each month for a Zoom meeting. Hopefully this will increase participation when we get together to discuss on the 2nd Wednesday of the month.

The first topic Pastor Tim will cover will be *The Great Ends of the Church*. Our Presbyterian Book of Order identifies six "great ends" to guide the vision and mission of the Presbyterian Church. These are our guiding principles, if you will, and serve as a framework for the church's understanding of its ministry and mission. We will study each of these purposes of the church to see how they are relevant to our lives today.

The Great Ends of the Church are:

- the proclamation of the gospel for the salvation of humankind;
- the shelter, nurture, and spiritual fellowship of the children of God;
- the maintenance of divine worship;
- the preservation of the truth;
- the promotion of social righteousness;
- and the exhibition of the Kingdom of Heaven to the world.

HABITAT FOR HUMANITY LOOKING FORWARD TO SPRING

Second Presbyterian Church is excited to share the news about an opportunity to work alongside others in the community to build a Habitat House this coming spring in Knoxville. There will be more information to come about this hopeful endeavor, but how good it will be to help a family secure sustainable housing in our area. Knoxville Habitat has been an affiliate of Habitat for Humanity International since 1985.

Habitat homeowners help build their own homes alongside volunteers and then pay an affordable mortgage. With housing, parents can provide stability for their children while their sense of dignity and pride grow. Studies show that health, physical safety, and security improve while education and job prospects increase. Habitat for Humanity is a global, nonprofit housing organization working in local communities in all 50 states and in 70 countries. There will be many ways Second Presbyterian can help with this new house, so stay tuned!
