

On Second Thought...

I can't believe 2020 is already here. Honestly, I never really thought that far ahead when I was younger. The year 2000 was the big milestone everyone talked about reaching. No one really talked much about what happened after that.

Once we had all survived Y2K, the arguments started over how to refer to the first few years of the new millennium. Was it the "aughts" or the "tens" or the "ones"? Some people insisted on saying the whole number - two-thousand-and-eight. Others tried to shorthand things, as we had in the 20th century - twenty-oh-eight. The closer we have gotten to 2020, however, the latter has caught on. Thank goodness. Saying "two-thousand-and-nineteen" is such a burden.

I think the disagreement will end at the beginning of next month. Everyone already knows how to say "twenty-twenty" - we've used it for years to describe "perfect" vision! We think that it must be some elaborate measurement, some objective reality that scientists and eye doctors came up with to denote vision that is perfect. That isn't the case, however.

Twenty-twenty vision is actually a relative term. It isn't meant to describe "perfect" vision, but rather "normal" vision. By looking at lots of people, eye doctors decided years ago what a "normal" human being should be able to see when standing 20 feet away from an eye chart. If you have 20/20 vision, it simply means that when you stand 20 feet away from the chart, you can see what the "normal" human being can see.

Of course, as we all know, there's really no such thing as normal. However, there *is* a standard that we are trying to reach with our eyesight, and many of us need some help to reach it. I can never remember having 20/20 vision without the assistance of corrective lenses, but for a long time my vision has been 20/20...with help. In order to reach the standard, I need help from an optometrist, an optician, and the technicians who make my glasses and my contact lenses. These are people I am very grateful for in my life!



Our spiritual lives are the same way, with one major exception. No one except Jesus has hit the standard. All the rest of us need help. The Good News is that we receive all the help we need from God. God helps us in several ways: through Scripture (John Calvin used to refer to Scripture as the spectacles which help us to see God clearly), through the people in our faith community, through the guidance of pastors and mentors and teachers, and - most importantly - through the grace of Jesus Christ.

A few years ago, the Session of 2nd Pres wrote the following words:

Responding to God's love and grace, we are a welcoming, faithful, and hopeful community, following Jesus and serving him in the world.

We call this our Vision Statement. I think this year, however, I am going to refer to this as our **2020 Vision**. It is the standard we are striving to reach as a community of faith in Jesus Christ.

We can do it, with God's help.



Wednesday Night Bible Study

What happens when Israel settles in the Promised Land and forgets their God? The book of Judges answers this important question with difficult, and sometimes disturbing, stories of Israel's leaders and people. After the death of Joshua, the people of Israel begin a repeated downward spiral. The Israelites adopt the corrupt practices of the Canaanites, which leads to a cycle of sin, oppression, repentance, deliverance, and peace. Each cycle is worse than the last, and each deliverer is not as strong, or as good, as the previous one.

The book of Judges highlights six judges during this time and shows their increasing corruption. These judges start off fairly well (Othniel, Ehud, Deborah) but become increasingly worse (Gideon, Jephthah, Samson). The book ends with two very disturbing stories that show how incredibly lawless the people have become. The result is summed up in the final verse of the book, Judges 21:25 – *In those days there was no king in Israel; all the people did what was right in their own eyes.*

We hope you join us on Wednesday nights this winter and spring as we study this exciting book of stories from the early days of Israel's time in the Promised Land. Most people are not taught these stories as children and few have studied them as adults. Fair warning – most are PG-13 and a few are rated R!

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WINTER WEATHER POLICY
