On Second Thought...

This month the 4th of July falls on a Sunday. While Presbyterians don't usually observe or celebrate secular holidays in sacred worship, the juxtaposition of Independence Day and The Lord's Day does give us a chance to pause a moment before the waving of the flag and the shooting of fireworks and reflect on our identity as disciples of Jesus Christ living in the most powerful nation on earth.

For many Christians, the convergence of The Lord's Day and Independence Day is a happy one, a welcome opportunity to wear flag lapel pins or ties, sing *America, the Beautiful*, and give thanks to God for the blessing of living in a land that is free and prosperous and where we have the freedom to worship as we choose. For many, there is no conflict between love of God and love of country. Waving the flag and worshiping Jesus go together like apple pie and homemade ice cream.

But for many others, American Independence Day and The Lord's Day lie together less easily. There is a tension between the two that is highlighted when the two are celebrated on the same day. The cross and the flag are both demanding symbols, competing against one another for our deepest loyalty, devotion, and allegiance. For many, the coming together of The Lord's Day and the Nation's Day makes visible a decision that faces us every day, even though we aren't always aware of it. It's the same choice Joshua presented to the Israelites just before crossing into the Promised Land: *Choose this day whom you will serve*.

Most of the time the choice between God and country is not put so starkly. Part of the pride in being American is knowing we were founded on something greater than one person's vision, that we stand for ideas like freedom and equality. We remember those who have sacrificed for these ideals, that we are part of something bigger than ourselves, and that we - each one of us - can help build it, defend it, make it stronger. There is something very basic and very good about being proud of one's native land, something very natural about placing our hands over our hearts as we sing the national anthem and say the pledge. Most of the time, for most people, the choice between the love of God and the love of country is not an either-or decision.

However, when American Independence Day and The Lord's Day fall on the same day, the tension between



being a citizen of the country and a citizen of the Kingdom of God comes starkly into view. Whether we are aware of it every day or not, there is a tension between our national pride and our commitment to worship and serve Jesus Christ. Jesus gives his disciples their mission at the beginning of Acts: You will be my witnesses in Jerusalem, in all Judea and Samaria, and to the ends of the earth. Jesus calls his disciples to reach every nation, to stop at no border, to respect no division of race or nationality. Jesus' mission is a global mission, not a national one.

Americans often forget that the Gospel of Jesus Christ existed long before Columbus sailed the ocean blue. We must always remember that the Gospel crossed many borders to get here, that if the Gospel had only one flag it never would have gotten to Europe, much less America. We must remember that if Jesus had thought love of God and love of country were one and the same, he would have ignored everyone outside of Israel. But he didn't. And for that we should be truly thankful.

For most of us, we can have it both ways. We can watch the fireworks and pray the Lord's Prayer. We can pledge allegiance to both the flag and the cross, without much chance of doing a disservice to either, recognizing that we have many allegiances to give in this world.

But in some ways, ways both large and small, there come occasions for all of us when we have to choose whom will we serve, which passport we carry, which allegiance finally claims us. There inevitably come occasions when duty to country will conflict with duty to Christ, when the demands of our citizenship on earth will be at odds with the demands of our citizenship in heaven. We would do well to remember our baptism in those times, that we are first and foremost citizens in the Kingdom of God, the God who made heaven and earth and before whom nations rise and fall.


July 11th Acts 16:11-40 Paul and Silas in Philippi


JULY 4TH IN THE ATRIUM, PRIOR TO WORSHIP.

Anya Graduates

On a blustery May 9, 2021, Maryville College held its outdoor 2021 graduation ceremony following masking and other Covid protocols. Among the graduates and college officials holding on to caps and gowns that windy day,

Anastasia (Anya) Dunn was present.

You may remember Anya, one of two Maryville College students who became the first recipients of Second Presbyterian Church's new 200th Anniversary Scholarship Fund awarded in 2018 during the church's 200th anniversary celebration of its founding. The other scholarship winner, Cameron Moore, graduated from Maryville College in the class of 2020.

In 2020 Anya Dunn was awarded a second 200th Anniversary Scholarship during her junior year at Maryville College, as she maintained her outstanding academic record while receiving other honors and scholarship recognition.


Anya received her Bachelor of Arts in biochemistry with a double major in Health & Wellness and American Sign Language & Deaf Studies. She was nominated as an Outstanding Senior, received the LeQuire Award (given to a senior pursuing a career in the field of medicine), and received the Liberal Arts Award (for a senior with the highest grade point average in all core classes taken at Maryville College).

Since graduation, Anya has begun a summer's training position at the East Tennessee Children's Hospital, continuing her long time interest in pediatrics. She plans to continue her academic pursuits this fall, first planning to attend graduate school to train as a Physician Associate, then continuing her long range goal of caring for and advocating for pediatric patients and their families. She hopes to attend a worship service at Second Church this summer to thank our congregation for the support and encouragement the members gave during her years at Maryville College.

The congregation of Second Presbyterian Church maintains its commitment to its endowed 200th Anniversary Scholarship Fund which remains invested with the East Tennessee Foundation. While the principal has not yet reached its first goal of \$200,000, the value of the fund grows as donations are added, with only the earnings being used to finance the annual undergraduate college scholarships at UT and Maryville College.
