On Second Thought...

Somehow the price of gasoline came up recently and our children were pretty shocked to find out that when Tuesday and I started driving, gasoline cost \$.50 per gallon. They couldn't imagine gas prices being that low. Truth is – I can't either anymore. Less than \$1.00 per gallon seems like a distant memory to many of us.

In recent years, gasoline prices have seen a good deal of fluctuation. The average person has become very aware of what economists have known for a while – the price of gasoline directly affects the cost of many other staples. A few years ago, when gas hit \$4.00 per gallon, people were quick to notice that the price of eggs doubled and the cost of a gallon of milk increased by 70%. Many organizations, especially trucking companies and those in the hospitality industry, began adding a "fuel surcharge" around this time. Interestingly, the price of gas is now around \$2.40, but that "fuel surcharge" has not disappeared, nor has it decreased. Funny how that happens.

Of course, things like milk & eggs are traditionally sold in fixed amounts, so it's easy to track the price of these goods over time. Some companies, however, have found a more subtle, less noticeable way to increase profits and pass cost increases along to the consumer without sticker shock. They decrease the quantity of the product while leaving the price the same. Coffee, for example, was sold in 1-pound containers for years. In the 1980's, however, coffee companies began reducing the size of their containers to 14 and 15 ounces while keeping the price the same. They have continued to reduce the size of their packages until today, when the standard amount for most packages of coffee is around 11 ounces. The price, however, has stayed relatively the same.

Other manufacturers have followed suit: diapers, ice cream, cereal, snack food, etc. Consumers say they feel the practice of decreasing the quantity while keeping the price the same is dishonest. Yet, surveys show that most of us do not change our purchasing habits in response to

this kind of manipulation the way we do to outright price increases. So the companies keep reducing the quantity. Until, that is, they introduce a "new, larger size" – which is really the original size – at a higher price. Then the consumer feels as if they are getting a better value, and the whole cycle starts all over again.

I bring this up because I have noticed these types of practices have influenced us in ways we aren't even aware of when it comes to our relationship with God and the church. We tend to see grace as a limited, finite product to be consumed – much like a pie. We might be satisfied with the piece we have, but we are worried that if more people show up then there will be less to go around and our slice will get smaller. So we keep quiet. We keep the Good News to ourselves.


The Good News, however, is that God's economy is a completely different economy than the one we are used to.

God's economy is one of abundance, not scarcity. The more people there are to share in God's grace, the more God's grace abounds. In fact, God says the more we offer grace to others, the more we receive ourselves. This is God's economy! It is one of abundance, generosity, and no hidden price increases. The question is — can we stop being consumers and learn to be people of abundant joy and overwhelming generosity in a world that believes in scarcity? Can we learn to be witnesses to a generous economy when the world says, "Get all you can for yourself"?

I truly hope so. Because I believe this is the calling of the church – to be people of abundant joy and overwhelming generosity who share the Good News of God's grace with as many people as possible. In a world where good news is often hard to come by, that's not nothing

We Believe: The Apostles' Creed


On Sunday mornings we are exploring Christianity's most basic beliefs as expressed in the Apostles' Creed. Although not actually written by the Apostles, the Creed reflects the theological struggles and formulations of the first century church. In a time when most people were illiterate and before the New Testament had been finalized, oral repetition of the Creed, the Lord's Prayer, and the Ten Commandments, taught new Christians the basic beliefs of Christianity.

Second Sunday Worship - Evensong

On Sunday, October 13th, we will gather in the Chapel for Evensong, a sunset evening prayer service that combines elements of both Vespers and Compline. Popular in both Roman Catholic and liturgical Protestant traditions, Evensong is centered around Scripture readings and Psalm singing. Vespers, from the Latin vesper (meaning "evening") is a prayer service occurring at sunset. Compline, from the Latin completorium (meaning "completion") is the final church service of the day in the Christian tradition of canonical hours. It is a contemplative service that emphasizes spiritual peace.

So that we may be true to the tradition of celebrating *Evensong* at sunset, the service will begin at 7:00 p.m.



Sunday, October 27th is Reformation Sunday. Reformation Sunday is celebrated on the Sunday in October preceding October 31st, the anniversary of the date Martin Luther nailed his 95 Theses to the door of the church in Wittenberg in 1517, thus beginning the Protestant Reformation. For Presbyterians there are three important phases of the Reformation that influence and inform our Tradition: Luther's reforms in Germany in the early part of the 16th century, John Calvin's reforms in Switzerland in the middle of the century, and Knox's reforms in Scotland a number of years later. Calvin was influenced by and built upon Luther's work, and Knox did the same with Calvin a generation later.

On Reformation Sunday this year we are going to celebrate Martin Luther and his contribution to the Protestant Reformation. The worship service will be modeled after Luther's worship reforms and the liturgy that day will be taken from the German Reformed Church's Reformation Day celebration. This worship service will be nearly identical to what we would have experienced in a German Protestant church in the latter part of the 16th century. We hope you join us on October 27th to celebrate this special day.



It is a tradition here at Second Presbyterian on the Sunday closest to All Saints Day (November 1st) to read the names of those members who have joined the Great Cloud of Witnesses in the previous year. 
