

On Second Thought...

I recently read about a young man named John Gilbert. At age five John was diagnosed with Duchenne's Muscular Dystrophy. It is an insidious disease that systematically, over a long period of time, eventually destroys every muscle in the body. John was told that this disease would take his life in about ten years, but he made it to the age of twenty-five before succumbing.

Along the way, life was very hard for John. Every year he lost something. One year it was the ability to run, so he could no longer play sports with other kids. Another year he could no longer walk straight. All he could do was watch other kids play. Then he couldn't even talk.

John wrote about his life when he could still write. He said that middle school was the most difficult time because he was teased mercilessly by other kids. They bullied and humiliated him. He went to a middle school dance. It was a disaster and he never went to another one. He was afraid to go to school. No one ever stood up for him. He would take a dog with him whenever he went to school. For protection. For security.

John was eventually named the ambassador for the Muscular Dystrophy Association in California. He got to know the governor, who decided to hold a fund-raising auction and dinner for this young, very sick boy. The governor got the National Football League to sponsor the affair. Lots of high-powered, famous, and wealthy people were invited and John was the guest of honor. For a boy with so many low-lights in his life, this was a highlight. He actually got to hold the Super Bowl rings of several NFL stars.

John's favorite sport was basketball, however, and his favorite team was the Sacramento Kings. So when the auction began, there was one item in particular that caught John's attention. It was a basketball autographed by every member of the Kings. When the bidding on this item began, John raised his hand to bid on the ball. He didn't have any money and he never could have afforded it, but he was so excited that he bid anyway. His mother, seeing his hand go up, reacted quickly and pulled his hand down. John

writes: "Astronauts never felt as many G's as my wrist did that night!"

The bidding for that basketball went on and on, and the price went to an astounding amount. Finally, one man called out a figure that shocked the room. No one else could match it. The man went up


to get the ball but instead of returning to his seat, he walked across the room and placed the ball into the thin, small hands of John Gilbert. Hands that would never dribble a basketball down the court. Hands that would never throw a ball to a teammate on a fast break. Hands that would never hit a 3-pointer at the end of regulation to win the big game.

John wrote about this moment. "It took me a moment to realize what he had done. I remember hearing gasps all over the room, then thunderous applause, and seeing weepy eyes. To this day I'm amazed."

Grace. Being given a gift that we could never have gotten for ourselves. Someone sacrificing a huge amount for us without wanting anything in return, other than the joy of giving. How would you have reacted to such a gift? With gratitude? With love? By trying to live a life worthy of such a gift? By looking for opportunities to do the same thing for someone else?

Better yet – how have you reacted? Because every child of God has been given such a gift. This is exactly what God has done for us through his son, Jesus. We are the objects of God's grace and love. We are Easter people! Called to live lives of joy and gratitude for the gift we have received. Called to live lives worthy of the gift we have already received. Called to pass this grace on to others. Not just enjoying our gift, but gifting it to others, as well.

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Upcoming Sermons/Topics

We will conclude our sermon series Exodus: Journey through the Wilderness on April 7th. On April 14th and 21st we will end our Lenten journey with a focus on Palm Sunday and Easter. Then on April 28th we will begin a 5-week series on The Five Solas. The Five Solas of the Protestant Reformation were the foundational principles that guided the Reformers in their desire to reform the church of their day. They were convicted that the church had drifted away from the essential, original teach-

ings of Christianity, especially regarding salvation. In seeking to re-orient Christianity to the original message of Jesus and the early church, five Latin phrases (or slogans) emerged that summarized the Reformers' theological convictions about the essentials of Christianity. We will look at one of these phrases each week. They are: Sola Scriptura ("Scripture alone"), Sola Fide ("faith alone"), Sola Gratia ("grace alone"), Sola Christus ("Christ alone"), and Soli Deo Gloria ("to the glory of God alone").

For April's Second Sunday Worship we will be journeying on The Way of the Cross, an ecumenical version of The Stations of the Cross. After Jesus died and rose from the dead, many people reflected upon his passion and death. Pilgrims began to visit Jerusalem and walk in Jesus' footsteps along the street where he walked, which is known as the Via Dolorosa, the way of pain. As they walked, they would stop along the way and remember what happened to Jesus.

As the years passed, the practice spread throughout the world but in localized settings. Many Catholic churches now have the Stations of the Cross along the walls of their sanctuaries. People can come to the sanctuary anytime and move from station to station, praying as they go. In the last few decades, Protestant congregations have embraced the practice (with some modifications) during Holy Week as followers of Christ remember his death and resurrection.

On Palm Sunday, April 14th, we will gather at 6:00 p.m. in the Chapel to begin our own journey with Christ on *The Way of the Cross*. Several different readers will be present to present the various parts of the Passion. Our journey will take us out of the Chapel, through the courtyard, into the main church building, and will end in the sanctuary. We will be walking together as a group and some navigation of steps will be necessary, though we will do our best to make this as minimal as possible.

We hope that you will choose to begin your Holy Week with us on *The Way of the Cross*, and that you will invite others to join us for our *Second Sunday Worship* in April.

Lenten Canticles: A Passion Cantata

At our Maundy Thursday service on April 18th, the Chancel Choir will present Lenten Chronicles: A Passion Cantata. Capturing the moods and colors of Passion week, Lenten Chronicles contains classic, well-known Lenten texts and melodies, seamlessly woven together with the spoken word. Containing beloved hymns such as Go to Dark Gethsemane, Jesu Joy of My Desiring, God So Loved the World, and Jesus My Treasure, this Passion cantata by John Leavitt will enrich your experience of Holy Week and the days leading up to Easter. The service will begin at 6:15 p.m. and will be held in the sanctuary.

Flowering of the Cross

Once again, this year EVERYONE is invited to take part in our annual "Flowering of the Cross" on Easter Sunday morning! Simply bring flowers from your yard, garden, the store, or even the side of the road with you to worship. Maybe you could even bring a few extras for some of our visitors! Then on Easter Sunday morning prior to the service, we ask that you come and place your flowers on the cross as you enter the sanctuary and before you take your seat. Following the service (weather permitting) it will be carried outside for all to see and have their pictures made with.



Kirkin' o' the Tartans

On Sunday, April 28th, we will celebrate our Presbyterian Scottish heritage with a Kirkin' o' the Tartan Service during worship. "Kirkin" comes from "kirk," the Scottish word for church, so the phrase literally means the "Churching of the Tartan." Most people, however, take it to mean "blessing" of the tartans and the families, regions, and regiments they represent.

Some people claim the origin of this ceremony dates back to the Proscription Act of 1746 placed by the victorious English over the defeated Scots after the Battle of Culloden (1745). Scots outside the British military were forbidden to wear traditional Highland garb. These proscriptions also included bagpipes! Legend says that Scots would hide a swatch of their clan tartan when going to church services and touch it at a specific time during the services to recommit themselves to the Lord and their Scottish heritage. However, Scots in Scotland had never heard of such a thing until American or Canadian cousins asked questions about the tradition.

In actuality, the Kirkin' o' the Tartans was created by Dr. Peter Marshall on April 27, 1941 at the New York Avenue Presbyterian Church, Washington, D.C. In those dark days for Britain in World War II, Dr. Marshall, pastor of the church and twice chaplain of the United States Senate, wanted to raise funds for British War Relief and revitalize the pride of Scottish Americans in their heritage. A few years later the Washington National Cathedral (Episcopalian) made it an annual event which still continues to this day.


Dean Farmer



Fireside Chats - Update

From November 2016 – January 2017, ninety-seven members of this congregation met in small groups to discuss various aspects of their experience of Second Presbyterian Church. They shared why they decided to become members of Second Presbyterian, why they stayed when the split occurred, and when they had felt the most energized and connected to God through the mission and ministry of this congregation. The final question asked of each group was: If you had 3 wishes for the future of Second Presbyterian Church, what would they be (and why)?

Those of you who attended these Fireside Chats know that the answers to this final question were as varied and diverse as they were inspiring and hopeful. Some were specific and measurable while others were very general and difficult to quantify. Some were easily attainable while others will never be fully attainable this side of the Kingdom of Heaven. Still, these wishes did not disappear into the ether, never to be considered again. In fact, just

the opposite is true. We have returned to the list many times over the last two years to check-in with how we are doing in working towards these wishes.

Pastor Tim recently shared with the Session that a number of the specific and measurable wishes had been accomplished, or are on the way to being accomplished, over the last two years and the Session indicated that this should be communicated to the congregation. Listed below are the quantifiable wishes that were expressed in the Fireside Chats that have been accomplished, or that we are currently working towards making a reality. Some of these, by their nature, will never be fully accomplished and will be goals we continue to pursue. However, we have done enough at this point that we feel comfortable including them on the list below. Let's not stop, however. If YOU had 3 wishes for Second Presbyterian Church, what would they be? And how can you begin to work towards making YOUR wishes a reality?

Keep the core of Sunday School and Wednesday nights, no matter what other things we add

Get our kids involved in outreach

More UT students attending/involved

Make the hymn page numbers in the bulletin more visible

Education about Islam/Muslims and other non-Christian religions
