FAITH and...

On Second Thought...

One of the most frequent questions I get asked as a pastor is the one about prayer. You know... "If God is everywhere, knows everything, doesn't change (the theological words are omniscient, omnipotent, and immutable) and has a plan and purpose for everyone and everything, then why do we pray for things like healing or jobs or patience? Why do we pray prayers of intercession for other people? It's not like we're going to change God's mind or anything." Good question.

I usually quote C.S. Lewis' response to the question: "Prayer doesn't change God, it changes me." Which, I guess, is as good an answer as any. Then I usually point out examples in scripture of God changing God's mind in response to the pleas of humans. Abraham convincing God not to destroy Sodom and Gomorrah if only one faithful person could be found; Moses convincing God not to destroy the Israelites after the Golden Calf incident; God relenting from destroying the Ninevites after they repented. "So what's the harm in asking," I say, "Who knows?"

However, I must confess that the question has often been one that I ask myself, too, so I don't know how helpful I have been. Prayer of this sort has always been a bugaboo for me. I do believe in a Sovereign God who knows all, whose character doesn't change, and who has a plan and purpose for the world. Yet here I am asking God to do what I want God to do – to step into life and redirect it. And God's apparent failure to do so on many occasions makes me wonder just what Jesus meant when he said, "Ask, and you shall receive." Hey – just because I've been to seminary doesn't mean I don't struggle with my faith just like everyone else!

Last month, I rearranged my office. That meant moving all my books, and I found a book that I hadn't read in many years and didn't really remember reading at all. The book is called *Praying for Friends and Enemies* and is written by Jane Vennard, an adjunct professor at Iliff School of Theology and a Spiritual Director who teaches classes and leads retreats around the country. I sat down and thumbed

through it and it deals with this question. So, I thought I'd share what I found helpful and see if it helps you, too. Vennard cites Douglas Steele, who uses the image of a wall to help us understand prayer:

[Steele] wrestles with the possibility that intercessory prayer could infringe upon the freedom of the people for whom we pray. He decides that it does not because "the effect of our prayers for them would be at most to lower the threshold in the person prayed for and to make the besieging love of God...slightly more visible and more inviting." People still have the freedom to "accept or reject the invitation that is being forever offered."

Vennard continues: Lowering the threshold is an interesting image. Imagine a wall with the besieging love of God on one side and the person we are praying for on the other. Our prayers do not bring God's love to the other, for God's love is always present and God is always waiting for people to respond. Our prayers do not force God to do anything to another. Our prayers lower the wall, so that people can experience what is already there. As the wall comes down, people might become more aware of God's love, more open to God's love, more willing to receive God's love. People for whom we pray have the choice to accept or reject God's presence in their lives.


I don't know about you, but I find that extremely helpful! God doesn't change in that image – his love and grace are constant. Turns out, C.S. Lewis was right – it's we who need to be changed in order to fully receive God's love and grace.

So I'm thinking that, first – I should ask if the wall that needs to be lowered is one that I helped to build. If so, then I'd darn well better take a jackhammer to that wall myself before I even *think* about asking God to do my dirty work for me. Second, once I've resolved

that issue, I not only need to be praying for the wall to be lowered, but asking God how I might be an instrument to help lower the wall – no matter how it got there – so that God's love and grace can shine in.

What about you? Got a third or fourth idea? I'd love to hear it!

the interlocking global challenges of economics, ecology, security, and health.


Instead of a book, participants will receive handouts to read for the following week. The handouts will also be available on our website and through a link in the weekly email blast.

Emerald Youth Foundation Builds New Complex

n July 18, 2019, Clara Hardin and Helen Grant attended a very special prayer/praise session on site of the construction of the new Lonsdale Area Ministry Complex (nearing completion) at 1740 Texas Avenue. This complex is the latest of the Emerald Youth Foundation's expansion of service and outreach to youth in its more than 25 years of service in urban and suburban Knoxville neighborhoods. For most of those 25 years Second Presbyterian Church has included Emerald Youth Foundation in its mission budget.

The new Lonsdale community building and grounds contain a 30,000 square foot multi-purpose facility featuring a learning center, two full-size gymnasiums with basketball courts, locker rooms, concessions and kitchen, fitness area with weight room, dance/aerobics room with cardio theater, assembly room for gatherings, and a worship and performing arts area with practice rooms. There is space for the Cherokee Health Systems, in cooperation with the University of Tennessee, for the operation of a health center for the community. Outside there are two multipurpose synthetic turf fields for soccer, flag football and other sports.

Although there is much construction work to complete, EYF planned a prayer/praise ceremony for the community and local leaders to come together on a very hot July day for prayer and praise for this unique endeavor in an underserved intercity neighborhood. EYF staff planned well—helping hundred of attendees safely negotiating entry over uneven, rough grounds and through a maze of unfinished rooms to the large gym area where the group sang and prayed together for the success of this project. To culminate the program many knelt on the uncovered concrete gym floor to write personal and group prayers for the future of this awesome facility.

As the faith-based Emerald Youth Foundation continues its mission of working with Knoxville's youth to instill, encourage, and support learning, good human relationships, and good health habits, the organization requests Second Church's prayers and interest in its success.







A Letter from West View Teacher - Patrick Pollock

To the members of Second Presbyterian Church,

I just want to thank you again for your generous donation that provided many of my Safety Patrol students the opportunity to visit Washington, D.C. as part of the Knox County Schools contingent. For many of those students, it was their first time being away from their parents and possibly their home.

Even though much of our 4-day trip would be on the road, the excitement in the air was like no other feeling. Friday morning, May 31, we met at Chilhowee Park around 6 am. It literally was a zoo of parents, teachers, chaperones, buses, and more. The students came dressed in their Wildcat Safety Patrol shirts ready to trek north to our nation's capital. During the trip up the students took naps, played on their phones, sang, laughed or watched movies. I might have even heard the occasional, "Are we there yet?"

Finally, we reached the Manassas National Battle-field Park in Virginia. The students departed the bus and got a whirlwind tour of the battlegrounds with historical information from the escorts. Then we headed to our hotel for dinner and rest.

The following two days can only be described as a crash course in tourism. We started with the House of Representatives in the Capitol Building where we met with our own U.S. Representative, Tim Burchett, and had a photo with him. Then we were on to a multitude of other venues including the Smithsonian Museums, National Mall, National Zoo, Lincoln, Jefferson, Martin Luther King Jr., WW2, and Korean memorials, as well as George Washington's home. The students were immersed in a wealth of knowledge that will stick with them as long as they live.

The last day of our journey was spent on the bus travelling back to Knoxville. The students enjoyed the same luxuries as on the way up to D.C., but as much as the trip home lacked a bit of luster, nothing could prepare them for the fanfare that ensued upon our arrival back into town. We were met by a multitude of police officers on motor bikes, in police cars, and even a Knox County Sheriff's helicopter, all of which escorted us back into the comfort of our families who were waiting for us.

Not only was this trip of a historical and educational nature, it was also a wonderful experience for our students and one they will not soon forget. Thank you again for your generosity. It was definitely a trip for the books.
