On Second Thought...

This Advent and Christmas season we are thinking about music and how particular hymns and songs sung this time of year help us understand the Gospel better. The sermon series, Sing We Now of Christmas, and the accompanying Advent Devotional booklet were both designed to get us thinking about the power and the impact of music. I have written some about that in the Introduction of the Advent Devotional. Sarah and I have written about the different hymns we will be preaching on while members of the congregation have shared some of the hymns/songs that hold special meaning for them, as well. We hope that this year's Advent Devotional is a blessing to you as you reflect on and get into the spirit of the holiday season.

When Sarah and I selected the hymns we'll be looking at on Sundays between now and January 6th, we didn't necessarily choose our personal favorites. (Though I do know Sarah loves O Come, O Come, Emmanuel.) We chose pieces that reflected the different Advent themes each week - hope, peace, love, joy - as well as hymns we felt we could connect with in our preaching. However, we asked the folks who wrote in the devotional to write about their favorites, or ones that held meaning for them. It's interesting to read them. O Holy Night was chosen by 4 different people - which is appropriate. Silent Night was chosen twice. Two people chose pop songs and most of the rest chose familiar hymns. Doug Matthews chose the beautiful Some Children See Him, ever poignant but especially so during these racially charged times. And Leslie Matthews chose the entire Handel's Messiah!

I have so many favorites this time of year. I wrote in this space two years ago about my love for *Little Drummer Boy*. Another favorite is the hymn *Lo*, *How a Rose E'er Blooming*. It is sublime, for its content, its poeticism, its melody, and its harmonization. When I was a child, the local news station would regularly play a wonderful handbell arrange-

ment of Once In Royal
David's City that,
with all of its melodic
and internal runs, still
"rings" in my head today.
For me, it embodies the feeling of Christmas. The song
It Wasn't His Child made me
weep the first time I heard
it years ago, and still brings
tears to my eyes to this day.

A few years ago, I fell in love again with the old British carol, set to the music of Gustav Holst, *In the Bleak Midwinter*. The imagery of the poetry is stark and haunting, yet hopeful at the same time. I encourage you to get out the hymnbook – or just go to Google – and read this wonderful poem, especially the final verse which calls us to give Jesus the only thing that he wants from us – our heart.

I've thought about this hymn a lot this year because we are instituting a new tradition at Second - a Longest Night service. (You can read the details inside this newsletter.) For many, this time of year can be bleak. They are dealing with loss, illness, loneliness, depression, or pain. The reality of their lives stands in stark contrast to the hope of the Incarnation. In the Bleak Midwinter acknowledges that both of these things can exist simultaneously, and so does the Longest Night service. Things may feel bleak, yet we remember that a light has shone in the darkness. It may be difficult to see that light, to feel its warmth - but gathered together, as a community of faith, it becomes easier to remember that we are not alone, that we are loved. It becomes easier to feel God's peace and proclaim the truth, the joy, and the hope of Jesus' birth.

Lessons & Carols December 9th

On Sunday, December 9th, during worship, the Chancel Choir will present an Advent Lessons & Carols Service. This is a service of Scripture and song that dates to the late 19th century. We will listen to Scripture readings recounting the promise of the Messiah, the Incarnation, and the events surrounding Jesus' birth, interspersed with anthems, hymns, and songs that reflect on the lesson's message. There will be a brief homily reflecting on the Peace candle and the hymn chosen as part of the Sing We Now of Christmas series. The choir has been rehearsing the music for this service since the end of the summer! We hope that you will come and support their hard work as they proclaim God's Word through song.



The Longest Night Service December 21st

The Christmas season can be a painful time for some. It may be the first Christmas without a family member who has died in the last year. It can be a time when feelings of loneliness or loss or isolation or estrangement from family are amplified. It can be a time when the anguish of broken relationships, the insecurity of economic well-being, the weariness of ill health, the weight of a recent diagnosis, or feelings of being disenfranchised or disempowered can make it difficult to believe the promise of the resurrection in the darkest nights just before Christmas. The constant refrain about the joy of the season and getting together with friends and family reminds many of what they have lost, or may have never had. We need space and time to acknowledge our sadness and pain; we need to know that we are not alone.

For this reason, Second Presbyterian will start a new tradition this year. On Friday, December 21st from 6:00-7:00 p.m. we will hold a Longest Night service in the Chapel. The Longest Night service is traditionally held on the longest night of the year and recognizes that the Christmas season can be a painful time for some. It is a time to pray, read Scripture, sing, and be reminded that God's presence is for those who mourn, for those who struggle, and that God's light continues to shine in the darkness, offering hope to the hopeless.

All are invited, especially those who have experienced loss in the previous year and those who want to stand in the place of darkness with others. We hope that this will be a time of healing and hope. We are also offering rides to those who do not or cannot drive at night, or for those who simply do not want to come and go alone. We have a list of volunteers who want to make sure that anyone who wants to attend this worship service will be able to do so. Christmas Eve Worship Service

Once again this year we will gather in the sanctuary on Christmas Eve at 7:00 p.m. for our Carol & Candle Lighting Service. This service is a tradition at Second going back many decades and has come to be a cherished opportunity for our church family to celebrate the birth of Christ together. The Chancel Ringers will play, we will sing as many carols as we can fit into the service,

hear the Christmas story, and, of course, end with *Silent Night*, sung by candle light. A time of fellowship will follow the service in the Fellowship Hall for those wishing to come. Bring your friends and family or invite a co-worker. You can even invite a stranger to join us! Pre-service music will begin at 6:40 p.m. All who come will be blessed by being part of this holy evening.

5th Sunday Worship - December 30th

Our next 5th Sunday Worship in the Fellowship Hall will be on December 30th. We will celebrate a Covenant Renewal Service and will include communion. We will not have communion the

following week on January 6th. Communion will be served in a special way this Sunday, in celebration of the conclusion of our 200th Anniversary year.

A New Worship Opportunity in the New Year – Second Sundays at Six!

Beginning in 2019, we are implementing a new alternative worship service on the second Sunday of each month at 6:00 p.m. in the Chapel that we are calling, appropriately, Second Sundays at Six. This will be an opportunity to experience different styles of worship, or simply to worship at a different time than normal. The style of worship will range from ancient to modern and will be worship that engages the senses, is interactive, and participatory. Each month will be different and planning is currently underway, but so far such things as Taizé worship, a healing service, worship led by a contemporary vocal ensemble, a Bluegrass service, contemplative

prayer, a jazz service, and *lectio divina* have been discussed. If you don't know what half of those are – don't worry! You'll see more about *Second Sundays at Six* in the January *Second Edition*.

For now we just wanted to let you know so you can put it on your calendar. Or not! This may not be for you, and that's okay. But you might know someone who would like to express their love for God and experience God's presence in a non-traditional way. If so, please let them know about *Second Sundays at Six* (brochures will be available soon in the Atrium) and invite them to come!



Three on the Road

In the late summer and in early November three "traveling ladies" of Second Church made two trips to the Morgan Scott Project in Deer Lodge, Tennessee, in the mountains beyond Wartburg. We, like several other Second Presbyterians, had visited the mission project in the past, but the program has expanded and changed through the years and we three looked forward to the hour and one-half trip. Morgan Scott's support is multi-denominational from several churches and other organizations.

In the hot throes of summer Clara Hardin and Helen Grant took a car loaded with items for the Morgan Scott Thrift Store, but each had another purpose in going. Clara had an appointment with the new director to learn more about the project's plans and needs for

the future. (Second Church's Presbyterian Women has often included Morgan Scott with missionary contributions.) Helen Grant had an appointment with a member of the Deer Lodge Congregational Church to see and photograph a stained-glass window said to be from the now demolished Walnut Street Second Presbyterian Church.

On Trip No. 1, we delivered our thrift store donations, had lunch with the director, and heard an excellent report on the work of the mission. Helen Grant found the window that had been given to the Congregational Church, mounted high on the wall behind the pulpit. It is a lovely image of the resurrected Jesus which, we believe to be the former central figure in a large multi-paneled window facing

Walnut Street in the third building of Second Church. Deer Lodge Congregational Church is struggling and losing members in a small community predominately Baptist in denomination affiliation.

On Trip No. 2 Anne Armstrong and Helen made the second trip to Morgan Scott on a cold and very rainy/windy November Friday, again loaded with donations for the thrift store. The mission parking lot was filled with cars lined up for a food distribution day. The thrift store was filled and running over with customers, and we felt lucky to unload in the rain and be on our way.

We "traveling ladies" came away from both trips convinced that we witnessed God's hands directly at work through this caring, hard-working project in an isolated, impoverished community with tremendous challenges to the well-being of many elderly, handicapped, unemployed, and under educated citizens. We name just a few of their projects:





- 1. Many of Morgan Scott's projects relate to the goal of teaching and providing resources to the residents ways to help themselves including a community garden on site—tended by volunteers with the harvests shared by those in need; free seeds and fertilizer and instructions for all who are willing to plant a summer garden; scholarships for transportation, school supplies, fees to the Tennessee College of Applied Technology and other higher education programs.
- 2. The project's thrift store has proved a financial success to produce revenue for the project's support and as a local "shopping center" where there are very few nearby retail outlets.
- 3. Morgan Scott, like Sunset Gap, hosts several work teams each year from around the country who live and eat at the mission while they repair and construct local homes as well as help with needs at the mission itself.
- **4.**The mission provides space for a Free Medical Clinic staffed by Dr. Tom Kim every other Friday.

On Trip No. 2, Anne and Helen were rewarded with a surprise encounter with a picturesque horse and buggy being expertly guided by a young Amish couple. They handled the weather well and, happily in Deer Lodge, there was no traffic congestion.




