

## On Second Thought...

Just a few days ago we had a glorious Easter worship service full of wonderful music, beautiful flowers, an inspirational sermon, and a moving baptism, all of which glorified God and proclaimed the hope of the resurrection. Then we arrived home afterwards to the news that several Sri Lankan churches had been bombed during Easter worship services, resulting in the deaths of over 300 people. The news reports are that the attacks were carried out by Muslims in retaliation for the mosque attacks in Christchurch, New Zealand, just over a month ago, and that Christians specifically were targeted.

According to a recent, well-respected report from the Pew Research Center, Christians are the most persecuted religious group in the world. Not long ago I received an email from someone wondering where the prayer vigils are for Christians who are murdered. It's a good question. Six months ago, following a shooting that killed 11 Jews in a synagogue in Pittsburgh, the community of Knoxville came together at the Arnstein Jewish Community Center for a prayer vigil. Last month, following the shootings in Christchurch in which 50 Muslims were killed, the community gathered at the local mosque in Ft. Sanders for a prayer vigil and show of solidarity. Meanwhile, between February and March around 250 Christians were killed in Nigeria, yet there was no prayer vigil. Over the last 50 years Christianity has been all but driven out of the Middle East, usually with violent attacks and persecution. Yet there have been no prayer vigils. While not all of the 350 people killed on Easter Sunday in Sri Lanka were Christian, most of them were. And the fact that 3 Christian churches were targeted specifically during Easter worship services makes this an attack on Christianity. Yet, I doubt there will be a community prayer vigil for this attack as there were for the others.

Some will say it's because secular progressives feel Christianity has it coming. They associate Christianity with crusades and inquisitions and imperialism and antisemitism and homophobia and islamophobia and Trump supporters and abortion protesters and institutional pedophilia. To them the persecution of Christians is simply cosmic karma at work. Others will say that Christians, especially in America, hav-

en't made it very easy for others to feel empathy for Christianity because they have not been humble or tolerant or loving and have often made a big deal out of relatively minor inconveniences, claiming "persecution" for their beliefs. The fact that most of the people making these claims don't

look or seem very "persecuted" makes it easier to ignore real persecution when it arises.

While there may be some truth in both claims, I don't think either of these fully explain the lack of prayer vigils for the persecution and killing of Christians. I happen to think it's because persecution is just part of what it means to be Christian. Christians have been the most persecuted religious group in every Pew Research Center report ever. Going all the way back to the lions in the Roman coliseum, persecution of Christians has been commonplace. Christians shouldn't be surprised at this; we are told this right up front. Our Lord and Savior himself regularly told us that we would be persecuted for following him. In his very first sermon Jesus said, "Blessed are you when people revile you and persecute you and utter all kinds of evil against you falsely on my account. Rejoice and be glad, for your reward is great in heaven, for in the same way they persecuted the prophets who were before you." (Matt. 5:11-12) In his last talk with them before his arrest, he reminded them, "If the world hates you, be aware that it hated me before it hated you. If they persecuted me, they will persecute you." (John 15:18,20)

Paul persecuted Christians before he was Paul, then suffered terrible persecution time and time again after he began following Jesus. Paul, Peter, James, and John all write about Christian persecution in their epistles. Christians have always been persecuted and will always be persecuted. If we had prayer vigils every time Christians were killed for being Christian, we would only ever have prayer vigils. This is such a reality that the church recognizes this by baking into our liturgies prayers for persecuted

Christians. In our Book of Common Worship, the Prayers of the People contain intercessions for those who are persecuted for their faith. They also show up in the Litanies for Epiphany, Good Friday, Morning Prayers, and Prayers for the Church.

It saddens me that American Christians think that inconveniences count as persecution when real persecution of Christians happens every day around the world. It saddens me that the persecution of Christians is so commonplace that the world doesn't care as much about the murder of Christians as they do

about the burning of a famous cathedral. It saddens me that Christians all over the world are subject to real and sustained violence due to their faith. Which is why we must remember the faith they – and we – proclaim. That Jesus has conquered death. That love will ultimately triumph over hate. That darkness and death and destruction and murder and terrorism will not have the last word. That the people who were killed in worship on Easter Sunday had gone there to hear and proclaim this message: Christ is risen! He is risen indeed! Hallelujah!


## **Second Sundays at Six**



Will Pruitt and Seth Reynolds are both graduating from Bearden High School this month and attending UTK in the Fall! Congratulations boys!




#### **Will Pruitt**





## **Highlights from the April Session Meeting**

- Received reports from the Preschool and Ministry Teams as information.
- New Elders were examined by the Session.
- Charles White was elected to the Preschool Board.
- Received the report from the Facilities Committee on the Bonaventure Schools facilities request and requested the committee and Stewardship Ministry come back with a recommendation to proceed or not proceed.
- Approved the Budget and Finance team request to designate (above operating Budget) giving to any project or activity approved by the Session upon the recommendation of a Ministry Unit.
- Approved the Budget and Finance Team request for a new designated Fund be created named the Entrance Sign Memorial Garden Fund and \$7,588 be transferred into this new fund from the Building and Grounds designated funds.
- Approved the Worship and Celebration Ministry Team recommendation to purchase 'the Glory to God', the new Presbyterian hymnal published in 2013 by the Presbyterian Publishing Company. The committee estimated that 500-600 copies would suffice.
