## On Second Thought...

The story is told of a young priest who was meeting with his spiritual advisor early in his ministry. He confessed to his advisor that he had some difficulties with some parts of the Nicene Creed. The older priest advised him, "Recite it anyway."

The young priest obeyed and recited the Creed daily. After a few weeks he went back to his advisor and confessed that he still could not believe everything in the Creed. "Recite it anyway," was the elder priest's advice.

Several more weeks passed until, finally, the young priest could stand it no longer. Barging into his spiritual advisor's office, he shouted, "Why do you *insist* that I keep repeating the Creed when there are some phrases that I disagree with?!?!"

"Because," the wise elder replied, "it's not your Creed. It is the Creed of the Church. You aren't saying what *you* believe, you are declaring what the *Church* believes and that you are *part* of that Church, whether or not you believe every point of doctrine."

I think we, in 21st century North America, with our strong emphasis on individual rights and freedoms, sometimes lose sight of this point. So often I hear people say they don't go to church because they don't believe everything the church teaches. Or people will say they are having a hard time finding the right church because they haven't found one that agrees with *them*. Or congregations, and even denominations, will split because they agree on almost everything except one fine point of doctrine or particular theological stance.

From its earliest days, Christianity was comfortable with the idea that we may believe different things about, well, different things. This is why we have four Gospels that do not always agree with one another! Agreement on every doctrinal matter or theological point is not (or at least shouldn't be!) a prerequisite for being part of a Christian congregation, denomination, or even Christianity itself. My seminary professor, Walter Brueggemann, used

to say, "In essentials, unity; in non-essentials, diversity." This begs the question, then, "What are the essentials?"

There are some beliefs that the Church has historically said are important; big ideas that the *Church* confesses as true, whether every individual in the Church does or not.

In the early days, when most people were illiterate and unable to read the Bible for themselves, the Church needed a way to teach people what these essentials were. Thus, the Apostles' Creed was formulated. It was taught to new Christians (along with the Lord's Prayer and the Ten Commandments) who would learn it and then recite it in front of the congregation so that everyone would know that the new Christians knew what the Church taught and believed (whether or not they believed every word of it themselves).

Starting September 22nd, we will be studying the Apostles' Creed in worship on Sunday mornings. There might be some things in there you aren't sure about. There might even be things in there that you disagree with. If you were going to write a Creed, you might write something different. But this is what the Church has said it believes and for 2,000 years Christians who have gone before us have recited it. Christians of all denominations still recite it today. It is the Church's Creed. We owe it to ourselves to learn what it means so that we can understand it, even if we don't believe it.

#### **New Sermon Series Begins September 22nd!**

We Believe is the title of our 8-part series which will explore what Christians believe by examining our most basic beliefs as expressed in the Apostles' Creed. Although not actually written by the apostles, the Apostles' Creed reflects the theological struggles and formulations of the first century church. In a time when most Christians were illiterate and unable to read the Bible, oral repetition of the Apostles' Creed, along with the Lord's Prayer and the Ten Commandments, helped

preserve and transmit the faith of Western Christianity. (It played no role in Eastern Orthodoxy.) It has been a beloved and enduring touchstone for Christians and Christian churches in the 2,000 years since.

Beginning September 22nd, Pastors Tim and Sarah will spend 8 weeks taking a closer look at the Apostles' Creed section by section to see what it is really saying about what *We Believe*.

## Regular Sunday School Resumes in September

Our regular Sunday School classes will resume September 8th, after a break for Labor Day on September 1st. There are three adult classes to choose from.

Faith, Science and the Future meets in Room 206 (upstairs) and studies current events using *The Wired Word*, an email curriculum that examines timely news events from a faith perspective.

The Bible Discovery Class meets in the Barbour Room and uses the This Present Word curriculum to study scripture.

Pilgrim's Class meets in the Library and either chooses books on contemporary topics or books of the Bible to read and discuss together each week.

On Sunday mornings, elementary and middle school students will meet Holly in the Children's wing for their Sunday school lesson. The high school students will meet in the youth room for *Waffles and The Word*.



#### **Wednesday Night Dinner and Programs Resume September**

On Wednesday, September 4th, our Wednesday evening dinner and programs will resume for the fall semester. The schedule will be the same as last year. Dinner will be at 5:30 p.m. Classes and youth activities will begin at 6:05 p.m. and will last an hour.

The first Wednesday of each month will continue to be an intergenerational program similar to what we did last year. The one difference being that we will be able to eat dinner with whomever we wish, and then break into intergenerational groups *after* dinner. Additionally, whenever there

is a 5th Wednesday in the month (we're looking at you, October), we will have an intergenerational fellowship activity, rather than a study.

On the rest of our Wednesdays we will continue to offer relevant and meaningful studies designed to help us in our spiritual growth. Throughout the year we will occasionally offer a 2nd class that will focus on a very narrow issue for a limited time, but on most Wednesdays the adults will all be together in the Fellowship Hall for the same study, while students will gather upstairs for their own time of spiritual growth and fellowship.

#### Wednesday Night Bible Study - The Book of Colossians

Over the last few years we have studied a lot of different things on Wednesday night – world religions, the 6 Great Ends of the Church, lessons from *The Andy Griffith Show*, heresies, the 7 Deadly Sins, just to name a few. Some people have pointed out, however, that we haven't really done a *Bible study* for our Wednesday night Bible study! While we have studied the Bible as part of these other classes, they are right that we haven't actually done a *Bible study*. So let's fix that!

This fall Pastor Tim will lead us in studying the book of *Colossians* for our Wednesday night Bible study. Often referred to as the most "Christ-focused" letter in the New Testament, this letter was written to the church in Colossae, a town on the Lycus river in the Roman province of Asia. The theme of the letter is that a Christ-centered spirituality ought not to drive Christ followers to spiritual practices and mantras in hope of transcendence, but into the heart of

the world that God longs to redeem. It offers an alternative vision of reality, an alternate way of living in the world as followers of Christ. Preaching on Colossians 3 in Berlin, Germany in 1932, Dietrich Bonhoeffer said of this letter, "We Christians are not dreamers with our heads in the clouds. Our faith is not opium that keeps us content within an unjust world. Instead, and precisely because our minds are set on things above, we are that much more stubborn and purposeful in protesting injustice here on earth."

We will study *Colossians* section by section this fall, until we have gotten through all four chapters. We may look at some scholarly work and some biblical commentaries along the way, but for the most part our textbook will be the letter itself. So don't forget to bring your Bibles! We look forward to seeing you on Wednesday nights at 6:05 p.m. in the Fellowship Hall.



The Presbyterian Women of Second Presbyterian Church will begin their 2019-2020 program year with four circles operating each month. In addition to circle activities there will be four general luncheon/special program meetings during the year where all interested church members and visitors are invited to attend. 
The Church Decorating Group (Formerly the House and Garden Circle), will also meet the third Thursday each


